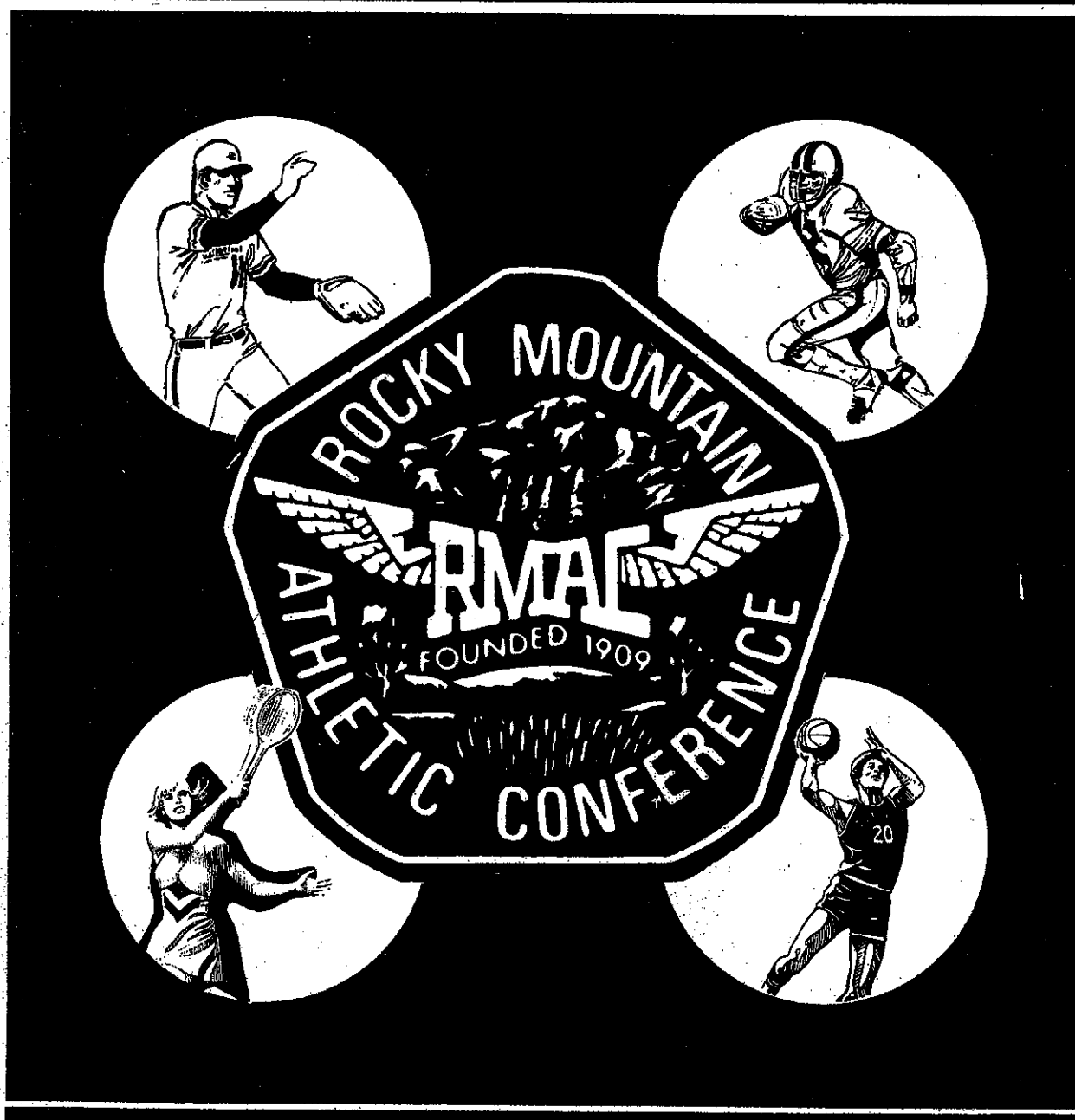

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Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference
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A Glimpse At The RMAC

Since its founding in 1909, the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference has undergone numerous realignments. In many instances, members with phenomenal growth withdrew to join conferences composed of such institutions. Others, because of distances and rising travel costs, formed or joined conferences which were more compatible financially and geographically. Over the year, RMAC membership has included colleges and universities in Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Kansas, and Nebraska.

An important RMAC realignment came in 1967, when the presidents of fifteen institutions in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, and Utah effected the merger of the Central Intercollegiate Conference, the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference, and six independents. The new RMAC set up two divisions (Plain and Mountain), with championship playoffs in football, basketball, and baseball, and conference-wide tournaments and meets in other sports.

In 1972 the two divisions were converted into separate conferences, each with its own championships. The Mountain group retained the prestigious name of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference, and the Plains group became the Great Plains Athletic Conference. In order to continue the fine relationships of the widely scattered institutions, the two conferences formed the Mountain and Plains Intercollegiate Athletic Association for the regulation of their inter-conference activities.

Continued rising travel costs prompted the dissolution of MPIAA on July 1, 1976, and the two conferences went their separate ways after nine years of gratifying and compatible relationships. Concurrent with the changeover, Commissioner Harry B. Kniseley took voluntary retirement and Dr. Paul W. Brechler became his successor.

As a result of the organizational change, the Great Plains Conference, for economic reasons, formed a more compact geographical alliance of colleges and universities of Kansas, Missouri, and Nebraska, thus returning RMAC to its old autonomy. The University of Southern Colorado transferred its membership from GPAC to RMAC, bringing the membership of the later group to eleven institutions. The University of Northern Colorado, a former member of RMAC and later a member of GPAC, withdrew in order to become an independent athletic entity and compete with larger universities.

Many of the current members of RMAC, for more than a half century, have built fine academic and athletic prestige, as well as strong, friendly rivalries. The younger members also have built strong prestige and traditions in their fewer years of proud progress, and have become strong competitors.

Throughout its existence, RMAC has continuously served the needs of institutions of modest size and limited athletic budgets. Although the athletic programs of members are not designed to be "big time," many former RMAC athletes have distinguished themselves in international and national competition over the years. Each member emphasizes the educational, unifying, and entertainment values of sports, and points with pride to the many advantages to be gained at smaller colleges and universities.

RMAC ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

FOUNDING

The second oldest active collegiate organization of its kind in the United States, the Rocky Mountain Athletics Conference was founded in 1909, and has continually served the worthwhile needs of area colleges and universities which are destined to remain modest in size. The Colorado School of Mines is the only school which has continuously been a member of the conference since its founding. The conference now has eleven members.

PURPOSES

The general purposes of the Conference are to promote mutual trust, friendly relations, fair play, good sportsmanship, and cooperation in the advancement of mutual best interests, and to maintain athletic programs within the frameworks and aims of the educational programs of member institutions.

GOVERNMENT

The RMAC is governed by its Constitution and Bylaws, which set forth the organizational structure, standards and uniform regulations and procedures, similar to those of other intercollegiate athletic conferences.

The supreme authority of the RMAC is the Presidents Council, composed of the presidents of all member institutions. The Council has authority to initiate, effectuate, or repeal legislation affecting the activities and regulatory status of the Conference. Serving in advisory capacities are the Executive Committee, the Athletic Directors Council, and the Faculty Athletic Representatives Council.

The administrative head of the association is the Commissioner, who motivates and coordinates the conference program; interprets and enforces bylaws and rules; maintains liaison with member institutions, athletic agencies, and the general public; and appoints game officials for football, basketball and volleyball contests.

CONFERENCE SPORTS

RMAC competition is held in nine sports for men and in five sports for women. Men compete in football, basketball, swimming, wrestling, track, baseball, tennis, golf, and cross-country; women compete in volleyball, basketball, softball, tennis and gymnastics. Team

champions in football and men's basketball are determined by win-loss percentage in round-robin play; all other sports for both the men and women are determined by conference-wide meets and tournaments.

FINANCIAL AID TO ATHLETES

Determined to operate on a sound financial basis, RMAC members limit individual grants-in-aid to tuition and fees. In addition, a student-athlete may work for his other college expenses. Conference rules also limit the number of grants which may be awarded in each sport.

ELIGIBILITY RULES

Eligibility rules basically are those of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, although a few conference rules are more rigid. To be eligible for participation, a student-athlete must be making normal progress, both qualitatively and quantitatively, toward graduation.

RMAC Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner

Probably the only man-wife team running an athletic conference in the United State, Dr. and Mrs. Paul W. Brechler serve as Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner, respectively, of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference (RMAC).

Dr. Brechler, nationally prominent in the field of intercollegiate athletics, became the new commissioner of the RMAC on July 1, 1976.

As a full-time administrative head of the conference, he motivates and coordinates conference activities, interprets bylaws and operating rules, and maintains liaison with member institutions, national associations and the general public. Brechler also serves as a non-voting associate member of the Presidents Council and the Athletic Directors Council.

Brechler held athletic staff positions at the State University of Iowa from 1936 to 1960. He was assistant basketball coach in 1941-42, business manager of athletics in 1946-47, and director of athletics from 1947 to 1960. He was in the U.S. Navy from 1943 to 1946, and later became a colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve.

In 1960, Brechler became the first commissioner of the Western Athletic Conference. He held that job until 1968, the year he resigned to become director of athletics at the University of California at Berkeley. He resigned from that post in 1973 to return to his home in Denver.

Mrs. Wanda Brechler earned B.S. and M.A. degrees from Iowa State University, where she later served as executive secretary in the athletic department for several years. An administrative assistant for the Western Athletic Conference between 1960 and 1968, she worked part-time for the RMAC until July 1 of 1978, when she became full-time assistant commissioner. She assists the commissioner in all phases of his responsibilities, with particular emphasis on the women's athletic program, and also does all the bookkeeping for the RMAC.

RMAC Supervisor of Officials John W. Lloyd

John William Lloyd, retired Big-Eight football and basketball official, serves the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conferences as part-time supervisor of officials. He is in charge of the evaluation and training of officials and also helps with their development.

Lloyd has been a prominent official since his high school days in Denver, City where he was all-around athlete in football, basketball and baseball. He played professional football for a few years and made his debut as a professional baseball player in 1940.

A football and basketball official since 1940, Lloyd has been a Big 8, Skyline and Rocky Mountain Conference official for 25 years, he has supervised football bowl games, basketball tournaments and has been a full-time working official in 1965. He has been a part-time official for 15 years in the Western Athletic Conference as an observer and evaluator of officials. He gains satisfaction in coaching and assisting promising young officials in the college ranks.

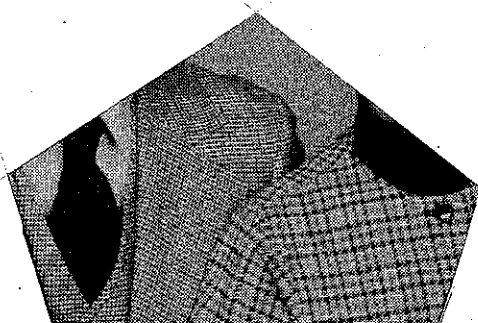


RMAC Information Director

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ADAMS STATE COLLEGE

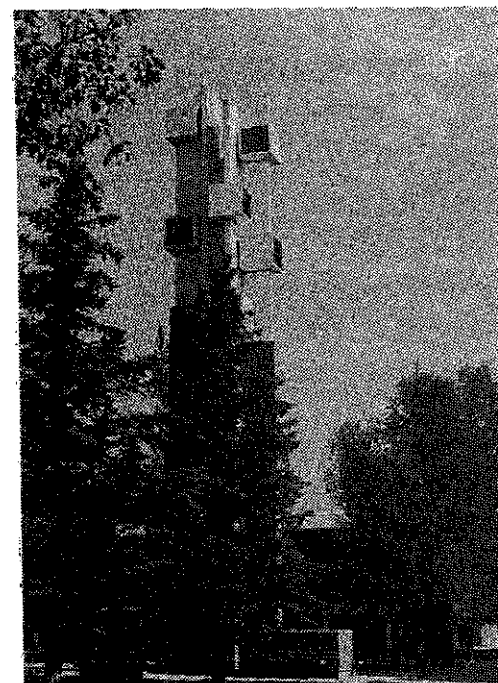
Alamosa, Colorado

Adams State College was founded in 1921 in the name of William H. "Billy" Adams, then Governor of the State of Colorado and a life-time resident of the County of Alamosa. The first class in 1925 consisted of a handful of students, but the college has grown to nearly 2,500 students. Adams State is an institution of higher learning with emphasis upon the liberal arts, teacher education, pre-professional, and occupational education.

The academic program is continually in growth. The nine divisions of the college offer Associate of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Arts, and Master of Arts degrees in the areas of Business and Economics, Cultural and Sociological Studies, Teacher Education, Physical and Recreational Resources, Psychology, Fine Arts; History, Government, and Philosophy; Humanities, and Scientific and Technological Studies.

The Adams State College campus started with one brick building - Richardson Hall - which is now the main administration building, and is grown into a spread of 90 acres and 49 buildings. About 39 per cent of the students come from the San Luis Valley, 49 per cent from the remainder of the State of Colorado, and the rest representing 43 states and about 12 foreign countries.

ASC is located in the heart of the San Luis Valley of Southern Colorado within the city limits of Alamosa. The elevation of Alamosa is 7,500 feet and the population is about 8,000.



COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES

Golden, Colorado

Colorado School of Mines, the oldest institution in the United States devoted exclusively to the education of mineral engineers, has entered its 105th year as a state-supported school. In that time, it has achieved an international reputation.

The school's fall 1978 enrollment is 2,646, and increase of almost 57 percent since the Arab oil embargo. It educates students from all over the United States and some 50 other nations. Nearly 10 percent of its more than 9,000 graduates are working abroad, and about 10 percent of the student body hail from foreign countries.

CSM has a faculty of 174 in 11 degree-granting departments and 11 supporting departments. It offers courses leading to the bachelor of science, professional and advanced degrees in chemistry, geology, geophysics, mathematics, metallurgy, mining, petroleum, physics, chemical and petroleum-refining and mineral engineering. Masters and doctorate degrees are also offered in mineral economics.

The school operates from 34 buildings and about 375 acres, including an experimental mine in Idaho Springs, a 40-acre geophysical observatory in Bergen Park and the CSM Geology Museum.

The City of Golden and CSM campus are located at the foot of the scenic Rocky Mountain front range 13 miles west of Denver.



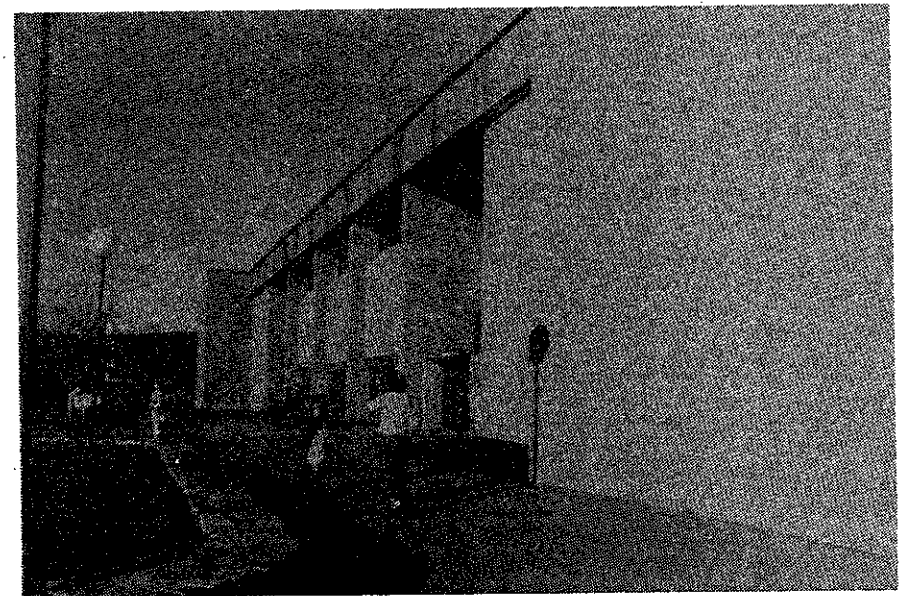
FORT LEWIS COLLEGE

Durango, Colorado

Fort Lewis College, located at Durango in the mountainous section of Southwest Colorado, is a state supported, liberal arts college with an enrollment of approximately 2,900 and a faculty of more than 130 persons, sixty-six percent of whom have earned doctoral degrees. The college offers majors in 22 academic areas.

All the buildings on the Fort Lewis mesa-top campus have been built since 1956 when the college moved to Durango from a campus southwest of town. The buildings include a library, College Union, Academic, Physical Education, Humanities-Fine Arts, Classroom and Theatre-Classroom buildings; Miller Student Center, Health Center, married students apartments, chapel, 13 residence halls and an 84-unit apartment complex built this year.

The campus also includes a swimming pool and playing fields. A ski hill adjoins the campus and a golf course is nearby.



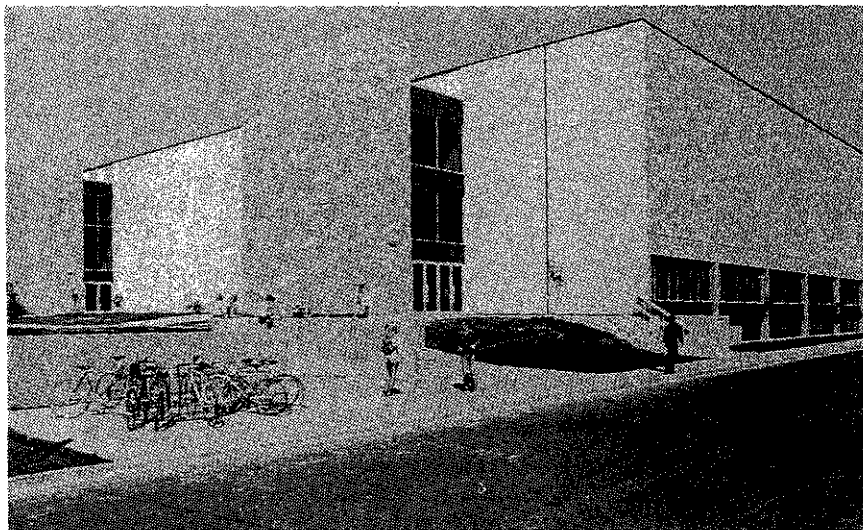
MESA COLLEGE

Grand Junction, Colorado

Since Mesa College first opened its doors as a junior college in 1925, thousands of students have embarked upon programs designed to help them assure important roles in our society.

In its new role as a four-year baccalaureate-degree college, operating under the auspices of the Trustees of State Colleges in Colorado, Mesa College continues to offer the strong comprehensive lower-division programs that attracted students in the past. In addition, its well-established occupational programs are being enlarged and strengthened, along with the many community-service activities for which Mesa College is widely known. It will no longer be necessary, however, for most students seeking a baccalaureate degree to transfer to another institution after completing the first two years at Mesa. New opportunities have also been opened for many local-area residents who, at least temporarily, terminated their college experience after attending Mesa for two years.

In 1957 Mesa College was fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as a community junior college. In March 1974 the college was also accredited at the baccalaureate by North Central.



NEW MEXICO HIGHLANDS UNIVERSITY

Las Vegas, New Mexico

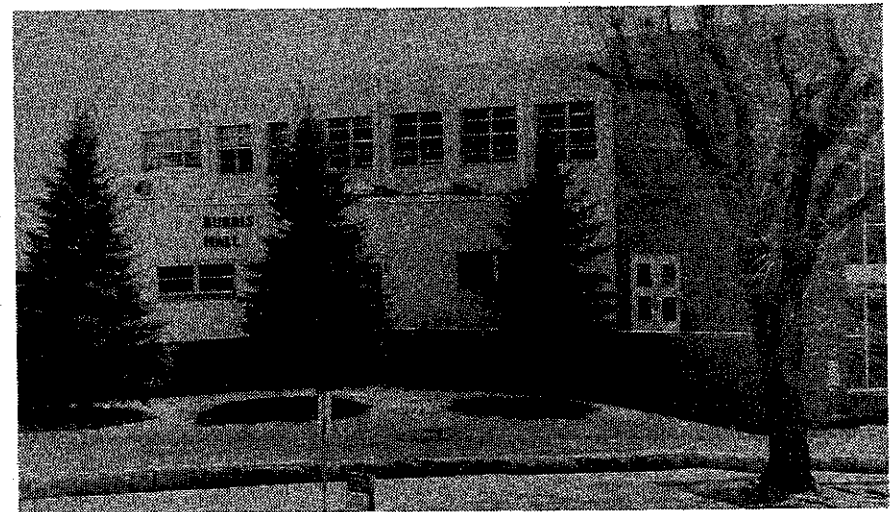
Founded in 1893, 19 years before New Mexico became a state, New Mexico Highlands University is a small (2,100 enrollment), state supported institution of liberal arts and sciences. It is a non-sectarian, multi-cultural university with an even 50-50 split of men and women.

The campus consists of 16 academic buildings on a 300-acre site. The faculty consists of 132 members with the effective student-teacher ratio of 15:1.

New Mexico Highlands University offers more than 500 courses per quarter in eight departments.

The university is located in historic Las Vegas, New Mexico. Situated on the old Santa Fe Trail, Las Vegas was the last town before travelers took the final of their journey through Glorieta Pass and into Santa Fe. The town boomed in 1879 with the arrival of the railroad. Today the population numbers around 15,000.

Las Vegas, or the Meadow City, was so named because it is in the area where the Sangre de Cristo Mountains break into the sweeping plains of Northeastern New Mexico.



REGIS COLLEGE

Denver, Colorado

This fall marks Regis College's 101st year of value-centered education in the Rocky Mountain West. Founded in 1877 by a band of Jesuit missionaries, Regis began as Las Vegas College in Las Vegas, Mexico. In 1888, Las Vegas College was combined with Sacred Heart College and moved to its present 90-acre campus in northwest Denver. The name was changed to Regis College in 1921 in honor of St. John Francis Regis, a 17th century French Jesuit missionary.

Regis College today is a four-year coeducational college of liberal arts and is one of 28 Jesuit sponsored colleges and universities in the United States. With an enrollment of more than 1,000 students, Regis draws from 38 states and nearly 10 foreign countries.

Confronting each of the great disciplines of learning, the College offers degrees in five academic divisions: The Division of Administrative Science and Business; Humanities; Natural Science and Mathematics; Social Sciences; and Philosophy and Religious Studies. Students all elect such professional concentrations as business, accounting, pre-medicine, pre-law, pre-dentistry and education.



SOUTHERN UTAH STATE COLLEGE

Cedar City, Utah

Southern Utah State College was founded in 1897. It was known as the Branch Normal School. As a branch of the University of Utah, it was created to provide teacher training for southern Utah public schools. In 1913 the school became a branch of Utah State Agricultural College (now Utah State University), and the name was changed to Branch Agricultural College. It was in 1953 that the name was changed to College of Southern Utah, and in July of 1969 that name was changed again, this time to Southern Utah State College. Southern Utah State became an independent, degree-granting, four-year liberal arts college in 1965. Prior to 1965, SUSC was a two-year institution.

Enrollment at Southern Utah State is just 2,000. Students at SUSC may choose a regular four-year degree program from 35 different disciplines, or they may choose from 17 certified vocational programs. SUSC also offers direct entry into professional schools in a number of areas including medicine, veterinary medicine, law and engineering.

The college is located on the eastern rim of the Great Basin near an unusual variety of scenic and recreational attractions including Bryce Canyon National Park, Cedar Breaks National Monument, Grand Canyon National Park, Zion National Park, Lake Powell National Recreation Area, Glen Canyon Dam, ski resorts and other forest and desert sites.



UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN COLORADO

Pueblo, Colorado

Much like the contemporary and dynamic architecture that covers its campus, the University of Southern Colorado is constantly changing and moving forward.

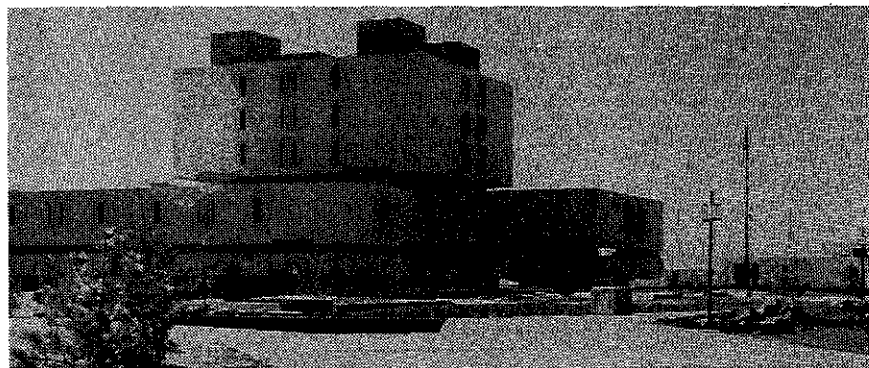
Proud educational and athletic traditions date back to 1933 when the institution was Pueblo Junior College. The college took its first giant stride toward becoming a four-year institution and granting its first bachelor's degree in 1965.

Formerly Southern Colorado State College, USC was granted university status July 1, 1975, and is the only university in southern Colorado.

USC serves a rapidly growing region and is constantly seeking new and improved methods of meeting the educational needs of its student body. USC's current enrollment stands at approximately 5,450.

The university is situated on an 840-acre campus northeast of Pueblo, a growing city of about 110,000 people. Facilities include an astro-turf football field, and all-weather track, six tennis courts, a baseball field and a complete gymnasium. The USC department of intercollegiate sports fields teams in eight men's and five women's sports.

USC is a state-supported institution governed by the State Board of Agriculture.



WESTERN NEW MEXICO UNIVERSITY

Silver City, New Mexico

Western New Mexico University was founded over 80 years ago as a state co-educational institution of higher learning. On the informal campus of 1,800, classes are small and led by full-time faculty members who are teaching scholars.

The University is located in a quiet modern-town of Silver City which serves as the marketing and financial center for a vast three-county area that extends to Arizona on the west and Mexico on the south. Located in the foothills of the Mogollon and Black Range Mountains at an elevation of 5,900 feet, Silver City has a climate that is dry, mild and invigorating. The university is situated on a rolling landscaped campus of 80 acres. The most recent addition to the campus is a large Health, Physical Education, and Counseling Complex and a new football stadium.



WESTERN STATE COLLEGE

Gunnison, Colorado

Established in 1911 to prepare teachers for Colorado's sparsely populated Western Slope, Western State College of Colorado is located at an elevation of 7,700 feet in the heart of the Rocky Mountains.

Appropriately nicknamed the Mountaineers, WSC athletic teams derive their crimson and slate colors from the sagebrush and Indian paintbrush flowers so characteristic of the alpine-desert terrain.

Western State is located in Gunnison and is a state-supported, coeducational, residential college with an enrollment of about 3,200 undergraduate and graduate students.

About 20 per cent of the students come from other states and the majority of in-state students come from the Denver metropolitan area.

WSC is dedicated to the values of education in the liberal arts, reinforced by opportunities for strong professional training in several areas, especially business and education.

Undergraduate degrees are offered in the areas of Arts and Humanities; Business; Education; Health; Physical Education and Recreation; Music, Natural Sciences and Mathematics, and Social Studies.

Sports play a big role at WSC. Men compete in eight intercollegiate sports, women compete in seven and intramural sports attract participation from about 75 per cent of the student body.
